MANY failures to select the right remedy for the sick is due to a failure along the line of properly taking the case. We might as well undertake to recognize a person by looking at his hand, or hand and foot, as to cover the case with the appropriate remedy from a few symptoms when there are many to come into the complete picture.

Often times in a case half reported the very symptoms that are most important, so far as the selection of the remedy is concerned,

are left out. This is especially true with the homceopathic method of prescribing. It is so natural for a patient to think that if he tells us that he has a cold, or indigestion, or rheumatism, that we ought to be able to prescribe for him forthwith, and strange to say, I have met more than one physician who seemed to have no better conception of Homceopathy than this; and evidenced it by asking such questions as, "doctor, what is your best remedy for diphtheria," or rheumatism, etc.
