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

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FOREWORD

The Book of the Yale Pageant, like the Pageant itself, aims to interpret the significance of Yale in the light of her history and traditions. For Yale is at heart a historic university. Pageant and Book alike unite many voices in utterance of a common loyalty. For Yale is in spirit a community.
