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
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PREFATORY NOTE.

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SYLLABUS ON THE HISTORY OF CLASSICAL PHILOLOGY.

A. General Introduction.

- a. Φιλόλογος—its original meaning and semasiological development.
 - First met with in *Plato* (e. g. Theaet., p. 146 α; Laches, p. 188; Rep., p. 582; Leges, p. 641 ε). Opp. to μισόλογος, βραχύλογος. Equivalent to πολύλογος, φιλόσοφος. φιλολογία = παιδεία (μουπική). Cf. Plato, Phaed. 61 α; Isoc. de Antid. 296: είτραπελίαν καὶ φιλολογίαν οὐ μικρὸν ἡγοῦνται συμβαλέσθαι μέρος, πρὸς τῆν τῶν λόγων παιδείαν, etc.
 - Alexandrian Period: Equivalent to φιλομαθής, πολυίστωρ (cf. Plut. Alex., c. 8). In this sense first applied to Eratosthenes, and among the Romans to Ateius Capito. Cf. Sueton. de gram., p. 108 R. "Philologi appellationem assumpsisse videtur quia, sicut Eratosthenes qui primus hoc cognomen sibi vindicavit, multiplici variaque doctrina censebatur."
 - Roman Period: φιλολογιῖν = learned conversation. Cf. Cic. ad fam. XVI 21; Plut. Cato Min. 6; Ps. Plut. Vit. X Orat., p. 844 D. φιλόλογοι opp. to πολιτικοί—Plut. Lyc. 42. Opp. to φιλόσοφος—Vita Plotini, p. 116: φιλόλογοι μέν δ Λογγίνοι, φιλόσοφος δὲ μηδαμῶς. Opp. to ἀπαίδευτος—Stob. Floril. 428, 53. Philologus = vir studiosus, doctus—Cic. ad Att. XIII 12, 3; Plut. de aud. poet. 30 d. More closely allied to philologist in the modern sense in Seneca, Ep. 108, 29, quoted below.
- δ. Γραμματικός (γραμματική, sc. τέχνη)—its original meaning and semasiological development.
 - Conversant with γραμμάτα (Plato, Phil. 17; Crat., p. 341; Arist. Pol. VIII 3; Categ. 9). γραμματιστής = a teacher of γράμματα (Plato, Prot. 312; Legg. VII 812).
 - Alexandrian Period: Clem. Alex. Στροφ. Ι, p. 309: 'Απολλόδωρος ('Αντόδωρος ?') ὁ Κυμαίος (unknown) πρώτος τοῦ κριτικοῦ εἰσηγήσατο τοῦνομα καὶ γραμματικὸς προσηγορείθη. "Ενωι δὶ 'Ερατοσθένη
