The publication of Part II. properly requires no preface; but the Author gladly takes this opportunity of expressing his best acknowledgments to the Bishops, the Clergy, and the Public Press, for the uniform encouragement which Part I. of the "Induces" has received.

In subsequent editions of this book, the leading subjects in both Lessons and in both Lectionaries (now to be found in Index No. 1 only) will also be introduced into Indices Nos. 2 and 3, and a constant endeavour will be made to attain a more matured précis of the Lessons and a closer adaptation from the Hymnals. The Author trusts, by these and other means, to render the work at once a welcome and ultimately an indispensable companion for the Reading Desk, the Study, the Sunday School, and at home.

The present additions to the body of the work consist of the Index No. 3, and a few extracts from Dr. Blunt upon the advantages of harmonising the teaching from the Pulpit with that from the Desk,—in other words, the Sermon with the Lections.

The Edition for 1873 will be published early in December—to be followed by Skeleton Sermons, illustrative of the Sunday subjects.

REMARKS ON THE COMPOSITION OF SERMONS.*

BY THE REV. J. J. BLUNT,

LADY MARGARET PROFESSION OF DIVINITY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

"I would propose to you as a further guide for the choice of your texts, that they should be taken as often as convenient from some portion of Scripture used in the Service of the day, or at least fall in with the Service,—if always, all the better." (Page 158.)

"There are other advantages resulting from this practice of adapting our Sermons to the portions of Scripture selected for the day. Our Services are so framed, the portions of Scripture to be read are so selected, that in the course of the year the whole faith and duty of a Christian is by turns brought before the congregation; and the Preacher, by thus falling in with the several items as they successively come up, will have failed in no important particular of his office: his Sermons will have thus comprised a complete round of instruction; and he will have defrauded his people, whether from inadvertency or otherwise, of nothing essential to them." "Further still, the Preacher will often find it necessary to give very specific warnings from his pulpit against one error or another." (Page 160.)
