LOUGH FEA.



OUGH FEA, the Lake of the Rushes, so called from the margin of rushes which fringe its shores, gives name to the manorial residence of the Shir-

ley Family near the town of Carrickmacross, in the Barony of Farney and County of Monaghan.

The house is built on a rising ground, surrounded by well-wooded hills, in the Townland of Duehatty, or "The black town," not far from a place of some antiquity which had been in sormer times the seat of a gentleman's family, who held their lands

under the Shirley Family, as "Middlemen," a position no longer to be found on the Shirley Estate.

The building was begun by the late Evelyn John Shirley, Efq. in the year 1825. Its ftyle is Elizabethan, felected as well-fuited to the furrounding scenery, and to an estate granted by Queen Elizabeth to Walter Devereux, the first Earl of Essex, in the year 1576,

the Husband of her Cousin Lettice Knollys.

Lough Fea House is erected entirely of

free-stone found on the Estate, and something after the manner of a College; on the right is the Great Hall, on the left the Chapel, in front the principal living rooms; over the entrance porch are the arms of Shirley with the quarterings of Basset of Drayton, Braose, Devereux, Plantagenet, and Ferrers, and the

DINING ROOM.

The ceiling of the Dining Room is ornamented with the initials E. I. S. and the Horseshoe badge. Here are the following Portraits:—

- Walter Devereux, first Earl of Essex, copied, in the year 1858, from the original belonging to Lord Bagot at Blithsield: half length in armour.
- 2. Robert Devereux, fecond Earl of Essex, the unfortunate favourite of Queen Elizabeth, and fon of the first Earl: whole length in armour, by Mireveldt.

In this Room is preserved a curious and valuable collection of books, relating to the history and antiquities of Ireland, collected by the present Mr. Shirley.

SOUTH ROOM.

The chimney-piece is made from the marble and alabaster found on the estate.

Pictures :-

- 1. Charles I. in armour, by old Stone, a fine whole length.
- 2. The Raifing of Lazarus, by Langetti.
- 3, 4. Two Battle pieces, by Borgognone.
- 5. Robert Shirley, Lord Ferrers of Chartley, afterwards Earl Ferrers and Viscount Tamworth, painted in the Robes which he wore at the Coronation of James II. in 1685, and given to Mr. Shirley by the Dowager Duchess of

Sforza in 1868. It was formerly at Ratcliffe

Hall, in Leicestershire, and is ascribed to Kneller.

WITHDRAWING ROOM.

The windows bear the royal cipher of Queen Elizabeth and that of her favourite the Earl of Effex. The cornice is ornamented with the Rose of England and the knot which was the badge of the Bouchiers, Earls of Effex, ancestors of the Devereux's. There are the following among other Pictures:—
