TREASURER'S REPORT

To the Members of the Class of 1915:

The following is a statement of the Class finances from December, 1914, to March 1, 1916:

The total amount of money pledged is \$10,185. This has been subscribed by 263 men, 38 per cent. of the class. The average subscription is \$38.70. The total pledge is somewhat below that of former classes, but if the remaining 62 per cent. of the unpledged men will sign up, there is every reason to believe that our fund can be one of the largest.

The bank shows a balance of \$1,054.80 to our credit, but there is still \$150 unpaid on the loan to the Photograph Committee and the Class Day Committee will eventually turn over about \$1,000.00

Prompt payment of Class Pledges when they fall due will be greatly appreciated by the Class Committee and will aid it greatly in transacting its business.

In closing I wish to thank the men who have aided me in many ways and the Class for its coöperation in response to my appeals.
