CHAPTER I.

EMPEROR'S ARRIVAL, AT MRTZ -- L'ARMÉE DU BILIN -- FIRST APPRARANCE OF THE UNLANH -- THE ENGAGEMENT OF SAABRBBUCK-ANECDOTES.
