- 5.—£.40 as Professor, and 1,500*l.* as Canon of Christ Church, the Canonry having been attached to the Professorship by King James I.
By the Statute under which the present Professor was appointed, he is bound to give annually two courses of lectures, in which he is to explain a portion of Holy Scripture or discuss questions relating to theology. By the new Statute, under which his successor will come, he will be required to give three courses of lectures annually.
- 6.—£.40 charged on the revenues of Christ Church by King Henry VIII. By the new Statutes of Christ Church this payment will not be made to future Professors.
The stipend of the Canonry is a first charge on the revenues of Christ Church.

In addition, Sir George Wheeler left a small endowment to the Professorship, which is held in trust by the University, and, being invested in Consols, produces about 24*l.* 8*s.* annually.

There is, besides, an annual payment of 11*l.* 5*s.* 2*d.*, the residue, after payment of sundry fees, of 20 marks (13*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.*), the original endowment. This is paid through the University Chest by H.M. Paymaster General.
2nd. The duties prescribed: "To give not less than 42 lectures in the course of

the academical year; six at least in each of the three University terms, and six two at least of the University terms to lecture during seven weeks not less than twice a-week."
