DURING the considerable time that the Author has resided in England, he has had the honour of giving instruction in the German Language to a very large number of Pupils, from the highest ranks of society; the success which has attended him, and crowned his pupils' efforts (many of them now speaking and writing German with facility), affords a most satisfactory proof of the efficacy of his instructions.

For some time he employed the books ordinarily in use; but defects, radically inherent in their plan, necessitated him to compile for himself the present work. In this he could avoid the faults that encumber the generality of German Grammars, most of which are made on the old system under which the Latin and Greek languages were taught in the last century; and at the same time show to his Pupils, if not "a royal road to learning," at least a far simpler and smoother path than is afforded by many of the self-lauded and much-advertised "Methods" of the present day.

His object has been to present a simple, effective, and low-priced Manual, which should enable a student,

after having carefully gone through the Fifty Lessons of which it consists, *to read, write, and speak German sufficiently well for ordinary use.* He could easily promise more; but how few attain this! and yet it is only what the experience of hundreds of Pupils has shown that it will infallibly accomplish.

This New Edition has been very carefully revised, and new matter largely added,—advantages which cannot fail to be duly appreciated by those into whose hands it may fall.
