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

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PREFACE.

DEVOTION to the service of God is the duty of every Christian who owes to Him the powers he has and the blessings he enjoys; who has been kept from danger by the care of God, and has to ply his daily calling; having to meet influences not favourable to godliness; who feels his weakness, but yet believes that he has a friend within the veil,—Jesus, the Son of God.—"Ask," the Saviour said, "and it shall be given to you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened to you: for every one that asketh, receiveth; and he that seeketh, finderth; and to him that knocketh, it shall be opened.

"Pray without ceasing," is the injunction given by an apostle. The meaning is, that devotion should not be occasional, but habitual; —that no act should be done, and no thought entertained, on which God's blessing cannot be asked; and that, as always needing light and

direction, the Christian should have recourse to all-sufficient help. Not many words are needed, —but a prayerful spirit is essential.

Besides prayer, helps to godliness will be found in devout meditation and careful reading of Scripture, with such aids to the understanding and studious perusal of the Word as may be readily obtained. The notes of BARNES are in some respects valuable. For the more learned. BLOMFIELD OF ALFORD deserve to be recommended, though the latter is questionable as regards orthodoxy, and the first cannot be depended on. The best popular comment will be found in the "CRITICAL AND EXPLANATORY POCKET BIBLE," published by Mr Collins, Glasgow, which may be obtained at a very reasonable price. The Rev. Dr Jamieson, known by his illustrations of Biblical Customs, the Rev. Mr Fausset, of St Cuthbert's, York, and the Rev. B. M. Smith, are annotators.

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THE DUTY OF FAMILY PRAYER.
