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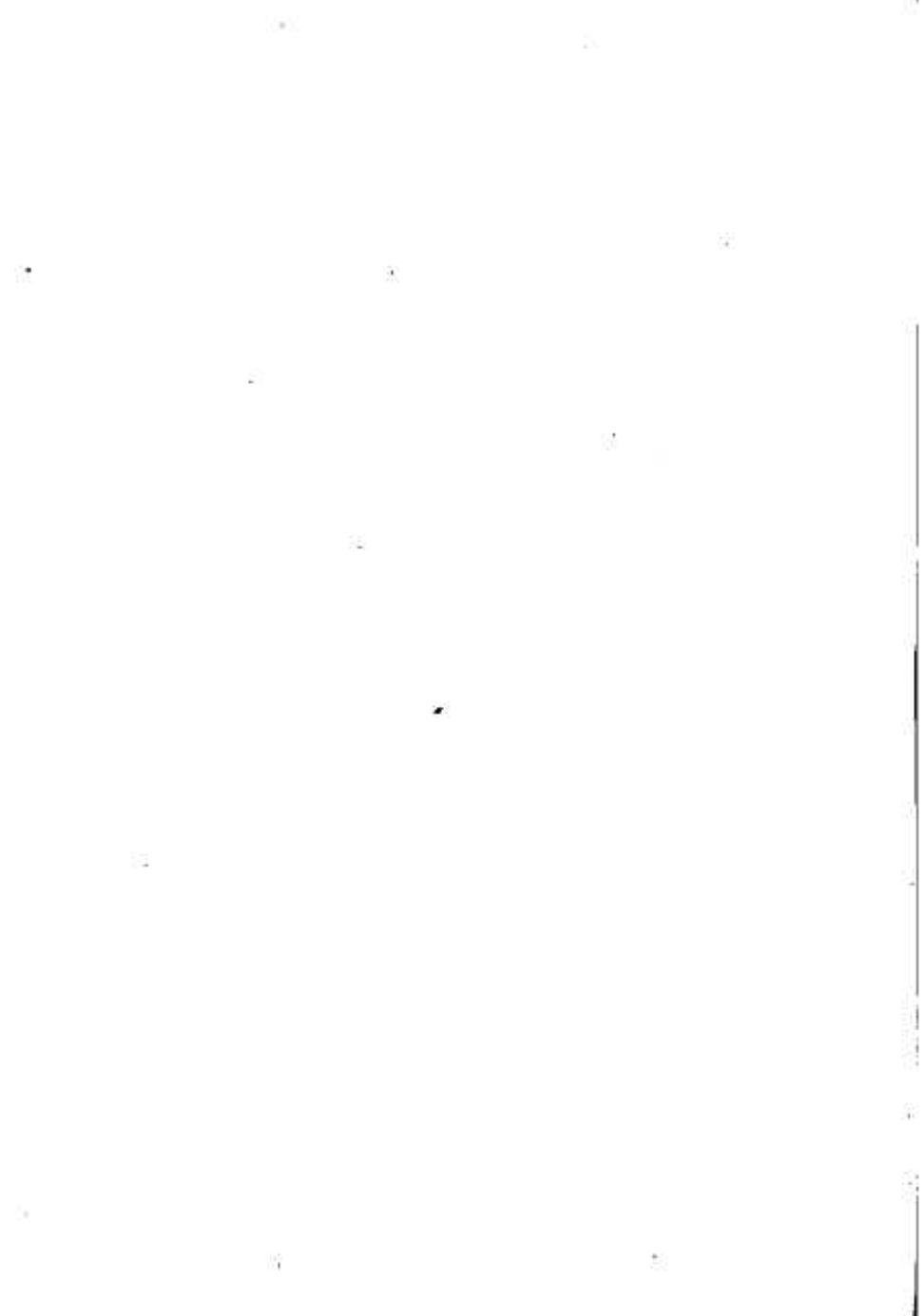

Obs.—Capital initial letters are used in German—

(1) As in English, at the beginning of sentences, quotations, etc.; (2) for all Substantives and words used substantively; (3) for Pronouns used in addressing Persons: *Wo kaufen Sie Ihre Bücher?* Where do you buy your books (§ 25, 4).
