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PREFACE

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My book "Indian Problems," published in 1908, was not only well received by the British Press, but was quoted by Lord Curzon in support of his argument in an important Imperial Debate† in the House of Lords. Among my humble suggestions therein was the granting of the Victoria Cross to members of the Native Indian Army, which was graciously taken into consideration by the King-Emperor, with the result that the much-coveted V.C. in due course came within the reach of my countrymen. That encouraged me to publish, in 1913, my "Anglo-Indian Studies." The late Lord Cromer devoted two chapters of his wellknown work "Political and Literary Essays"§ to a highly favourable review of that volume. "Mr. Mitra's thoughtful work," he wrote, "is a
