The report of the Superintendent and Resident Physician, presented herewith, contains, besides other information, a statement of the expenditures of the year, and is accompanied by the reports of the medical staff. These reports give details in regard to the number of patients treated in the Hospital and as out-patients during the year, with classified statements of their diseases and the results of treatment.

The whole number of patients in the Hospital during the year was 4,334, and they were under treatment an average of 23½ days each, making a total of 103,846 days, or 14,835½ weeks. The entire cost of maintaining the Hospital during the year, including every expenditure, excepting the cost of additions and reconstruction of buildings, new equipment and quinquennial report, was at the rate of

Leaving, therefore, the sum of . . . \$112,621 06

as the cost to the city of treating 4,063 non-paying patients, for a total of 13,837 weeks, which is at the rate of \$8.13 per week. But, by averaging the net cost of maintaining the Hospital for the year among all the patients treated, we find the average cost to the city, of board for each patient, was \$7.47 per week.

The report of the Superintendent explains in detail the expenditures made during the year in maintaining the Hospital, showing an increase in the number of patients treated and a net cost of \$7.47 per week for board and care, which is a reduction from that of the previous year and a comparatively large reduction from the cost of former years.
