

PREFACE.

This, the sixth volume of the Year-Book, presents the same general features as the fifth. The record by cities is alphabetical, the happenings in the larger ones being classified. It is believed that the greater scope given the paragraphs and tablesof general information will increase the usefulness of the book, whose various departments are given in the Table of Contents. The Year-Book purports to present a record of music publicly performed in the country which is compatible with a high standard. While the private character of the book justifies considerable elasticity in presenting details more interesting to localities than important to the country at large, the editor considers it an obligation to omlt nothing occurring between the seas that has present value or future promise to the loveliest of the arts. As the editor seeks to make an authentic record, the corrected programmes of societies and individual concert-givers are in all cases the authority. The * used throughout these pages indicates a first performance in any given city; the **, first performance in the country, applied to more important works; the t, new works in the larger forms. To seize upon and locate all first performances is so vexing a matter that the absence of the * in connection with newer names and titles should not be considered conclusive; rather let its presence be taken as an indication than as establishing a limit. Works written for voices and orchestra are understood to have been performed in their integrity unless a substitute for orchestra is named.
