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


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




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### Introduction

Goethe, who saw so many things with such clearness of vision, brought out the charm of the popular
ballad for readers of a later day in his remark
that the value of these songs of the people is to be
found in the fact that their motives are drawn
directly from nature; and he added, that in the

have greater skill than those who are educated.
