#### **HUBERT HILLARY SUFFERIN AIMES**

Was born January 25, 1876, at Woodmont, Conn. His father was a graduate of Columbia, the Class of 1850, and of the Yale Medical School in 1858. He prepared for college at the "Gunnery" School of Washington, Conn.

College career—Phi Gamma Delta. He received an appointment at graduation.

After career-For four years immediately following graduation he took a post-graduate course at Yale, University of Pennsylvania, and Columbia, receiving the degree of Ph.D. from Yale in 1905. He also spent two years in traveling, covering the United States, Hawaii, Cuba, Great Britain, France, and Spain, during which time he did considerable work in the libraries of those countries. For a time he held the chair of History and Political Science at Ursinus College, Collegeville, Pa., and is at the present time Instructor in History in the College of the City of New York, as well as being President of the Petremont Boat Company of New Haven, Conn. He has recently been appointed to a Fellowship in the University of Pennsylvania, and will spend the coming year in Europe, pursuing researches in Spanish-American history. He has published an article on "African Institutions in America" in the Journal of American Folklore, 1905; an article on "The Transition from Slave to Free Labor in Cuba," Yale Review, 1906; "History of Slavery in Cuba," G. P. Putnam & Sons. He is a member of the Masonic fraternity, the New Haven Yacht Club, the American Historical Association, the New Haven Chamber of Commerce, and the Alliance Française.
