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CHURCH MANUAL

The Church, and Candidates for Membership.

A Christian church is an association of professed Christians, united together for the worship of God and the celebration of religious ordinances, with the design of promoting their own growth in grace, and the interests of Christ's kingdom.

The members of this church, having united together for these purposes, cordially invite those dwelling among them, who hope they have "passed from death unto life," and who can accept the following confession of faith as substantially in accordance with the word of God, to unite with them in this holy service and fellowship.

To such as may be enquiring whether they are proper subjects for church fellowship, the following queries are proposposed as aids in that self-examination to which we are called by the apostle, " Examine yourselves whether ye be in the faith; prove your own selves: 2 Cor. xiii. b.

 Do I hate sin, heartily repent of it, and earnestly desire to be free from it?

Sensible of my own sinfulness, do I look to Christ alone

for salvation, trusting in his atoning sacrifice?

Do I love holiness, and am I aspiring after likeness unto the character of Jesus Christ--making it my purpose and aim to do, and to be conformed to his will in all things?

4. Do I delight in secret prayer and communion with God?

5. Do I love the word of God, long for the ordinances of his house, and take pleasure in social worship?

- 6. Do I love the people of God, being attached to them by reason of their relation to Christ, and according to the measure of his image which they bear?
- 7. Do I feel drawn towards the people of God with a desire to enter into covenant with them to be the Lord's; and to cast in my lot with them, hoping thereby to be bound more strongly to a life of godliness? And is my love for Jesus such that I feel constrained to acknowledge him openly, and solemnly to bind myself to his service?
- 8. Is it my deliberate purpose, whatever may be my circumstances, to consecrate myself—time, talents, property and services to him who laid down his life for me?
- 9. Do I approve of the modes of worship practiced by this church, and can I heartily accept its confession of faith, and feel that henceforth this is my religious home?
- 10. Feeble as I am, can I sincerely trust my Savior for the sufficiency of his grace to fulfill these holy vows, saying in truth:—

"To this dear covenant of thy word, I set my worthless name; I seal the engagement to my Lord, And make my humble claim?"

All who are considering the question whether it may not be their privilege and duty to profess their faith in Christ, are requested to make known their feelings to the pastor.

CONFESSION OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. You believe in the eternal existence of Jehovah, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, the Creator of all things; and that all his accountable creatures ought to render him perfect obedience forever.

You believe that Jehovah is possessed of infinite moral excellence, and that he administers a perfect moral government over the universe; that he administers also a providential government, which extends to all events, great and small; that to him alone belongs the glory of the saved: "according as he hath chosen them in Christ before the foundation of the world, that they should be holy, and without blame before him in love: having predestinated them unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will," (Eph. 1: 4, 5,) and that the impenitent in ain perish through their own voluntary perverseness.d

COVENANT.

You do now in the presence of the heart-searching God, before angels and men, avouch the great Jebovah, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, to be your God.

You receive the Father as your Father, the Lord Jesus Christ as your all-sufficient and only Redeemer, and the Holy Ghost as your Sanctifier.

Renouncing every sinful way, you devote your all unreservedly to God, and engage to walk in all his commandments and ordinances as required in his word.

You receive the brethren of Christ in this place, as your brethren, and his friends, as your friends. You also submit yourself to the government of Christ in his church, and to the regular administration of it in this church in particular. You covenant to walk in communion with your brethren, endeavoring to promote divine worship, and Christian tove and fellowship, by all the means of Christ's appointment within your power: and to live as a humble Christian, in a regular and faithful attendance on the worship and ordinances of Christ in this place, and in the performance of all your solemn engagements to God and this church, until by the providence of God you are removed.

In reliance on Divine grace, this you solemnly engage.

NOTE.—It is recommended that the church rise, in token of their cordial approbation, while the Minister says :—

We do now publicly declare our reception of you as a member of this Christian church, in full communion.
