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### PREFACE.

In the present volume all the cuneiform tablets in the British Museum having Aramaic inscriptions, are brought together for the first time, and arranged for purposes of comparative study.

The cuneiform texts with their Aramaic readings, as they appear on the tablet, are reproduced with as much fidelity as possible; and the individual Aramaic texts appear separately in a body of notes, where each is discussed. The reader is requested to compare the legends in both places, as it may sometimes happen in the process of etching, that the original is more faithfully produced in one place than in the other. The entire corpus of Aramaic inscriptions will be found grouped together at the close of the cuneiform texts, where readings may be compared, the development of the alphabet traced, and the individual peculiarities of the scribes noted.

In the transliteration and translation the cunciform order is followed, so that the line for line of the Assyrian may be preserved. This has obvious disadvantages, but I think the advantages outweigh them.

I have not thought it necessary to mark all accented letters, as il, šd, etc., nor have I usually indicated long vowels when they were not indicated by the PREFACE.
