REGULATIONS

The Library and Reading Room are free to all residents of Belfast over 14 years of age, who sign an agreement to observe such regulations as may be prescribed by the trustees for the government of the Library.

Persons residing temporarily in Belfast may use the Library, provided they furnish satisfactory references, or deposit with the Librarian the value of the book desired. Temporary cards are 5 cents.

Every person entitled to borrow books from the library will receive a card bearing his or her name and address. This card *must always be presented on taking out a book* for home use, and also on returning or renewing a book. Each cardholder will be responsible for any book drawn by means of his or her card. The card will be stamped by the Librarian when a book is taken, *renewed* or returned. When all spaces are stamped, a new card may be obtained for 5 cents,

Application for books is to be made on printed slips furnished by the Library. The applicant's name and address must be written on the slips with the catalogue numbers of several books desired, and both *card* and slip must be handed to the Librarian. In returning books, place the card and slip in the book with the ends projecting so that they may be seen; but *do not place them within where they cannot be seen* as they may be overlooked and thus, cause delay.

If a book-card is lost, ten days must elapse after notice is given to the Librarian, before a new card can be obtained.

Books will neither be *reserved* nor *transferred* from one card to another. One day for inspection is required for every book returned to the Library, *therefore no book can be given out the same day it is returned. No book will be changed the same day on which it is given out.*

Any person neglecting to return a book within **14 days** shall pay a fine of two cents a day. Books retained **2 weeks** beyond the specified time will be sent for by the Librarian, and the expense thus incurred will be added to the fine.

Books can be renewed but once, and books on which a fine is due cannot be renewed. Renewals can only be given *before* a fine is incurred. Books labelled "*Seven Day*" cannot be renewed, but must be returned in **7 days**.

Reference books marked R. L. in the catalogue and books, magazines and papers marked R. R., for Reading-Room use only, must never be taken away without special permission.

Those who use the Library are expected to care thoughtfully for the books and other property, and to conduct themselves with propriety. *No loud conversation will be permitted* in any part of the building, *and in the reading-room quiet must be observed.* Leaves of books must not be turned down, nor blank leaves torn out; neither knife, scissors, pen or pencil be in any manner used upon Library books or pamphlets. A violation of this rule relative to books, subjects the borrower to a fine of twenty-five cents.

Borrowers finding a book torn, marked or in any way defaced, are required to report the matter to the Librarian, otherwise they may be held responsible for the damage done.

NOTE.

This GENERAL CATALOGUE contains in one alphabetical arrangement entered by **author, title and subject** nearly all the books of the Library.

The fiction is catalogued by authors under the subject Fiction, the titles occur elsewhere, many works of Biography are entered but once under the subject; many works of a miscellaneous character occur but once under the author.

The Card Catalogue is the complete catalogue of the Library and should be consulted for omissions from the catalogue and for books added after this date.
