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PREFACE

This book has been prepared for the use of Filipino students in the intermediate schools for the study and practice of the general principles of English Grammar and Composition.

To the Filipino student, English is a foreign language. English Grammar must, therefore, be taught to him as a foreign language, as well as with a full recognition in details of his own special difficulties in learning that language. This book has been carefully planned and worked out to meet these requirements, and at the same time to fit into its proper place in the established educational system.

The method is generally inductive, but often deductive. There is a minimum amount of exposition and work for the teacher, with a maximum amount of illustration and work for the pupil. The emphasis is upon use. Only one thing at a time is presented, and this is clearly and simply stated, well illus-

trated, and thoroughly and variously applied. The logical as well as the psychological order is followed in general and in detail. Topics which present most difficulty receive special

treatment according to their importance.

This book presents a study of the parts of speech, their relations and uses in the sentence, their general inflections, and the elements of the sentence. Sentence structure and analysis are taught gradually in relation to the parts of speech and their uses in the sentence.

Each important topic in Grammar is followed by exercises in Composition, in application of the more important topics or of those more difficult for the Filipino student. Letter writing and the general elements of the various forms of composition are also developed with models, conversation, and outlines.

The author has had the assistance of a number of American teachers and Filipino teachers and students, and is especially indebted to Miss Charlotte Neale of the Manila High School for outlines and many suggestions.
