## CHAPTER I.

## PARENTAGE AND YOUTH.

HE subject of this Memoir was the youngest child of John Thompson, joiner and cabinet maker; and was born in Newcastle-on-Tyne, in the year 1783. Her father seems to have been a staunch Presbyterian, and a pious man: who, with habits derived from the early Covenanters, strictly observed the Sabbath, and led his family to the honse of God. When she was very young, her father, after a long and impoverishing illness, died, and left her mother entirely unprovided for, with five
