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PREFACE

This speller is the result of many years of experience on the part of the author in teaching spelling to grade pupils.

The written vocabulary of the average educated man does not exceed three thousand words. Recognizing this, the word list in this book is limited to those words which are common to the written vocabulary of business and social usage, the time and energy of the children not being wasted in acquiring a spelling vocabulary for which they will have no practical use.

Spelling is particularly a memory subject. During the elementary school period of the child's mental development, his brain is more plastic than it is later in his life, and therefore, though it is more receptive, it is also less likely to retain as a permanent possession the impressions received. In order to fix any given impression constant repetition is necessary. No spelling book heretofore published, within the author's knowledge, gives sufficient drill to insure lasting impressions on the child's brain. By the plan inaugurated in this book the necessary repetition is provided, while at the same time the interest of the child is held.

In the work for the second grade nearly every word is used seven times, exclusive of the number of times it may occur in the Dictation Exercises. For the third grade each word is used five times in addition to the Dictation Exercises. In the fourth, fifth, sixth, and seventh grade work each word is used four times in addition to the Dictation Exercises.

The arrangement of the words in this speller is entirely without reference to phonetic relationship, to family ending, or to other artificial classification.

The distinctive features of this book are:

- A practical list of words for each grade common to the vocabulary of the average child in that grade.
- Frequent review of all words. This review is progressive, and therefore maintains the interest of the child.
- 3. Dictation exercises so arranged that it is possible to correlate the spelling work with the work in English without detracting from the completeness of the book as a spelling book.
 - Independent arrangement of words.

In the six grades of work into which this complete speller is divided and which are intended to cover the second to seventh school years, both inclusive, training is given in a practical and usable vocabulary of approximately three thousand words.
