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

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PREFACE.

THE classification presented in this Vocabulary was originally made in order to discover the number of grammatical forms which actually occur in the Greek Testament. The use of the discovery is to lighten the labours of the beginner who is not acquainted with classical Greek. It is something to know what kind of words are rarely met with, and what are of most frequent occurrence. It is also sometimes helpful to compare a word of one particular form with others that are formed in the same way. Some readers may be encouraged by the fact that the entire number of words in the Greek Testament is so exceedingly small, and that of those words so many occur only once.

The author is not without hope that this Vocabulary may be of use to some who are not beginners. It is often worth while to look at a classified list of words for exegetical purposes, and in a dictionary or concordance

it is obviously impossible to present similar words side by side. Much more may be done in the way of classification than is attempted here. It would take but little space to add to the words thus collected a note of the New Testament authors who use them. Words belonging to St. Paul, to St. Peter, to St. Luke, or to the Epistle to the Hebrews, could easily be indicated by a single letter. A complete collection of synonyms, or of words not really Greek, could also be made without much labour from these materials.

But whatever may be done in this or other ways afterwards, the first step is a classified Vocabulary. It has been compared word by word with Brüder's Concordance, in order if possible to avoid omissions. The author hopes that it may be as useful to others as it will be to himself.

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
