CAP. I.

An Act for Granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares, and Merchandise, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies.

[PASSED MAY 6TH, 1835.]

SECTION

- 1.—Revenue Act of '81, '82, '83, and '84, continued.
- 2.—Additional Duty on certain goods imported from certain Countries.
- 3.—Duty on Fish imported.

WHEREAS an Act was passed in the forty-fourth Preamble. year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies."

And whereas the said Act was continued by an Act passed in the forty-fifth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies."

And whereas the said Acts were continued and amended by an Act passed in the forty-sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, chapter two, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies,"

And whereas the said Acts were continued and amended by an Act passed in the forty-seventh year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain duties on goods, wares, and merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies,"

And whereas it is expedient that the said Acts be continued for a further period, except as hereinafter amended.

Enacting Clause.

Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor, the Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :—

Revenue Act '81,
'82, '83, and '84,

I.—The above recited Acts, and every clause, matter and thing therein contained, except as hereinafter amended, and the provisions of this Act shall be continued and shall be in full force, virtue and effect till the eleventh day of June, which will be in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

Additional duty
on certain goods
imported from
Countries.

II.—From and after the first day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in addition to the duties by the above recited Acts provided to be raised, levied, collected and paid on goods, wares and merchandize imported into this Colony and its Dependencies, there shall be raised, levied, collected and paid on the goods, wares and merchandize hereinafter in this section

mentioned, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies from countries the fishermen of which have the privilege of taking fish on all parts of the coasts of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, and in which countries duties are or shall hereafter be levied upon fish and the produce of the fisheries exported from this Colony and its Dependencies to such countries, the following duties, viz. :—

- Flour—the barrel, seventy-five cents.
- Pork—the barrel, one dollar and fifty cents.
- Butter—the one hundred pounds, seventy-five cents.
- Tobacco—the one hundred pounds, five dollars.
- Kerosene Oil—the imperial gallon, five cents.
- Cornmeal—the barrel, fifty-two cents and one-half cent.

III.—From and after the first day of July in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, there shall ^{Duty on fish im-} be raised, levied, collected and paid on all fish imported, brought, or in any way coming into this Colony and its Dependencies, a duty of one dollar and fifty cents per quintal : ^{Provided.} Provided that the Governor may, by Proclamation, published in the *Royal Gazette*, remit the whole or any part of the duty imposed by this section on fish imported into this Colony or its Dependencies from countries making such changes or reductions in their tariff of duties, with respect to fish, the produce of fish, or other articles exported from this Colony and its Dependencies to such countries, as the Governor may deem equitable.

IV.—From and after the first day of July in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-five, it shall not be lawful for ^{Duty on dried fish} any importer of dried fish to warehouse the same in any ^{imported and} of the ports of this Colony and its Dependencies without ^{warehoused,} the payment of the duty in the third section of this Act mentioned, of one dollar and fifty cents on every quintal so warehoused, and the provisions of any Act of this Colony with regard to the warehousing of goods on the first entry thereof, or to the allowance of drawbacks upon exportation, shall not in either case apply or be construed to apply to such fish.

15 per cent. payable on above duties.

V.—Over and above the additional duties named in the second section of this Act on flour, pork, butter, tobacco, kerosene oil and corn meal, imported from the countries in the said section referred to, the duty named in the third section of one dollar and fifty cents per quintal on fish and the duty named in the fourth section of one dollar and fifty cents per quintal on dried fish warehoused, there shall be paid fifteen per cent, on the amount payable as such duties in like manner as the same is payable in respect of all the duties upon other goods, wares and merchandize referred to in the Acts recited in the preamble to this Act.

Salary.

VI.—There shall be allowed and paid annually to the Preventive Officer at King's Cove, two hundred and thirty-one dollars, and ten per cent, on all duties collected.

CAP. II.

An Act for Granting to Her Majesty a Sum of Money for Constructing and Repairing Roads, Streets, and Bridges, and other Public Works within this Colony, and to make provision for the protection and preservation of the same.

[PASSED 6TH MAY, 1885.]

SECTION

- 1.—Appropriation of \$112,217.80 on Main Lines and Local Roads.
- 2.—Appropriations to be applied to defray advances.
- 3.—Warrants for payments under this Act.
- 4.—Penalty for excavating Public Works.

SECTION

- 5.—Penalty and provision for cases of encroachment.
- 6.—Encroachments may be removed; Proviso; Right of Way.
- 7.—Public Markets.
- 8.—Appropriation of private lands for public purposes; Mode of compensation; Proviso in case of suits against Board of Works.
