1. God Prepares the World for the New Era (1).

We divide the history of the world into three great periods:

The history of the ancient world. (From the beginning to A. D. 476.)

The history of the Middle Ages. (A. D. 476—1492 or 1517.)

The history of modern times.

The history of the **Christian Church** is also divided into three periods:

The history of the early Church. (From the foundation [the first Pentecost] to A. D. 600.)

The history of the Church of the Middle Ages. (A. D. 600—1517.)

The history of the Church of the Reformation. (From the Reformation to the present time.)

Neither secular nor Church history is dominated by chance, but in either it is Jesus Christ who governs and leads all things to their goal as determined by Him.—Read Daniel ii, especially verses 37—45; Romans xi, 33—36; Revelations xi, 15; Phil. ii, 9—11.

During the dark period of the middle ages, where the pope held full sway in Christendom, Christ did not forget His Church.
