FOR THE YEAR 1915.

Boston, February 23, 1916.

Hon. James M. Curley, Mayor of the City of Boston:

Sir,—In compliance with section 24 of chapter 3 of the Revised Ordinances, the Board of Election Commissioners respectfully submits its annual report.

### NUMBER OF VOTERS.

At the city election held December 15, 1914, the number of male voters on the list was 111,533. The number of such voters on the first list published by the Board, August 1, 1915, was 101,178. From that time to the close of registration for the city election there were added the names of 13,391 male voters. The number of male voters on the final list sent to the polls on the day of the city election held December 14, 1915, was 114,569, an increase of 3,036 over the number on the list at the preceding city election.

There were 9,413 female voters registered for the city election held December 15, 1914. There were 11,043 female voters registered for the city election held December 14, 1915, an increase of 1,630.

### WARD REDIVISION.

In accordance with the provisions of chapter 676 of the Acts of 1914 the City Council redivided the city into twenty-six wards, each of which contains the following population, number of legal voters\* and number of registered voters:

### NEW PRECINCTS.

In accordance with an order of the City Council "That the Board of Election Commissioners be hereby requested to prepare and submit to the City Council a

division of the new wards into voting precincts containing approximately five hundred voters each," the Election Commissioners complied with this order by submitting to the City Council a division of the new wards into 223 voting precincts, which was passed by the City Council and approved by the Mayor.

### NEW MAPS.

In accordance with an order of the City Council the City Auditor was authorized to transfer from the Reserve Fund the sum of \$5,000 as a special appropriation to be expended by the Election Commissioners for the preparing, printing and posting of precinct and ward maps and for the purchase of 250 wall maps showing the new The contract for the furnishing of the wall maps was awarded to the lowest bidder at the price of \$900.

The Election Commissioners also had prepared 200 copies of maps of each of the new precincts and 1,000 copies of ward maps in the form of atlases. After a conference with the Mayor it was determined to have this work done by the city agencies. The preparation of the copy for such precinct and ward maps was made by the Street Laying-Out Department and the printing of the same was performed by the Printing Department. By this method the City of Boston secured accurate maps which are exclusively the property of the city and not dependent in any way upon the copyright of private persons or corporations. By this way of doing the work a substantial saving was accomplished.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

The law which allows the submitting to voters questions of public policy provides that the signers of applications shall append to their signatures their residence, with street and number, if any, and such applications shall be submitted to the Election Commissioners and the signers shall be certified as registered voters, but it does not provide when such applications shall be sub-We recommend that such application shall be submitted on or before five o'clock in the afternoon of the Wednesday preceding the day on which it must

Section 199 of chapter 835 of the Acts of 1913 provides that "independent" nomination papers shall, before being filed, be seasonably submitted to the Election Commissioners for certification. The word "seasonably" is capable of an elastic construction, and as a matter of practice nomination papers are frequently submitted for certification a few hours only before the time of being filed. It would be better, in our opinion, to have a time fixed for submitting such papers, and we
