



PREFACE.

This attempt to make the life and works of the First English Poet more widely known springs from the interest taken in the subject by an English Language and Literature Class of Men and Women which I conducted for some years at the Literary and Philosophical Society in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Lecturing upon 'Cædmon' afterwards to the members of the Society, I found that the idea of an English Literature prior to Chaucer was new to many of my hearers. CÆDMON AND HIS WORKS.

CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTORY.

Beyorn I proceed to speak of Carmon and his Works, I shall endeavour briefly to explain the position of that portion of the world which specially interests us Western peoples during the period of his life,—the seventh century. I shall speak first of the political situation, and shall then show the intellectual condition of the then existing nations, in order that we may more truly estimate the precise place which the Father of English Poetry holds in general literary history.
