#### PREFACE.

Some years since it was permitted me to write a treatise entitled "The Rock of Ages," on the One Eternal Godhead of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. The book was adopted by the Religious Tract Society, and has been widely circulated in England and America: it has also been translated into German: and I have received most grateful assurances from many anxious inquirers after truth, that the testimony of Scripture set forth in that work has, through God's infinite mercy, led them to the Saviour's feet. The communications which have reached me on this subject, some of them sent to me from dying-beds, and others from the bosom of home-life, may not be made public, but they lie deep in my heart, among the choicest and most cherished memories of my ministry. I may, however, mention that the book has been used as a class-book, not only in schools at home, but also among the native catechists of Hindûstan, and by brethren engaged in missions to the Jews. That God should deign to use so humble an instrument in the promotion of his kingdom is only another proof

how sometimes he is pleased to choose the things which are not to bring to naught things which are.

There was one chapter in that treatise, which was designed to establish the proposition, That Scripture in the Old and New Testament alike proves the co-equal Godhead of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. But it was of course impossible in a chapter, which only extended to twenty-five pages, to enter at any length into the Scripture testimony regarding the Spirit's Divine operations. I could do little more than barely indicate the evidences, which might be gathered from every field of his manifold work, to his Personality and Godhead. dences, enlarged and expanded, are embodied in the work now presented to the reader.\* And in addition I have sought (humbly and reverently I trust, remembering how great a mystery is here treated of) to inquire what is the teaching of the word of God with respect to the Spirit's infinite unction of the Son of Man, to His inspiration of Holy Scripture, to His striving with the world, to His quickening of those dead in sins, to His progressive sanctification of those who

are quickened, and finally with respect to the issue of His work in the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. So that this treatise may be in some measure regarded as the supplement and complement of the former.

My object in this later as in that earlier essay has been to present the witness of Holy Writ in its simplicity and power, when spiritual things are compared with spiritual. And I would therefore beg the reader not to expect here any learned disquisitions on abstruse points, nor even critical investigations further than are necessary to establish the plain meaning of the passages adduced. My hope is that teachers in our schools, and missionaries to Christ's poor, and possibly evangelists and pastors, may find in these pages a repertory of Scripture proofs to which they can easily refer for at least the leading subjects of this great and exhaustless theme.

From the blessed Reformation to our own day, the Church of Christ has had many times of refreshing from the presence of her Lord. There have been many and marked effusions of the Divine Spirit. But the very abundance of the grace vouchsafed has often seemed to tempt the enemy to produce transient but specious counterfeits of the Spirit's holy and abiding operations, and has rendered the necessity the greater of distinguishing between emotional excitement and transforming grace. It would have been foreign to the character of this treatise to enter into any discussion
