WHAT IS TRUTH?

PRELIMINARY REMARKS.

THE Lord Jesus said to Pontius Pilate, "To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness to the truth. Everyone that is of the truth heareth my voice."

Pilate waited not for an answer to his own question: "What is truth?"

TRUTH IS REALITY. The Son of God Jesus Christ is THE TRUTH. The words of truth are the expressions of reality. Revealed truth is the revelation of realities which could not be known through the exercise of human reason. The written words of divine revelation are the

signs of ideas conceived by inspiration of God. And, in as far as those same ideas are discerned and entertained, the truth revealed is known and held.

But in order to such a communion of mind with the inspired writers, the terms used by them—or the representatives of those terms in a translation—must needs be understood, as they repeatedly occur in the *progressive* revelation of the mind and will of God.

Here, a few remarks on the nature and uses of language, particularly in literary composition, may be pertinently made, and reasonably permitted:—

The ideal or radical meaning of any given term, is inherent in its form. In the primary use of terms, the literal meaning is the true. In secondary uses, the literal is subservient to the obvious. And in other, and more advanced uses, the literal meaning has no place, and is intentionally ignored.
