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OF the various and important events recorded to have taken place, during the two centuries and a half which have elapsed since the Society of Apothecaries became a separate and independent Corporation, there is none which reflects greater honour upon it as a Society, and more forcibly evinces the zeal, energy, and disinterestedness of its early members in the promotion of science, than the establishment of a Botanic Garden at Chelsea.
