

Jefferson Barracks, June 22, 1855.

My dear sister:

I received this morning your letter of the 15th. I expected to have left this post yesterday for Fort Leavenworth, but shall not leave When I arrive I will give you till to-morrow. a description. You were wrong in believing that the additional pay influenced me in accepting the appointment; it was the additional rank, and the compliment of being placed over the heads of over one hundred Captains, without being an applicant. I think and hope I have done right, and if it comes to the worst, I would prefer doing the same thing over, and then resign rather than decline; but for the next year my station will be as pleasant as any in the West, except I cannot reach home quite so soon. The mail is only three days from New York. Fort Leavenworth is three hundred miles farther,
