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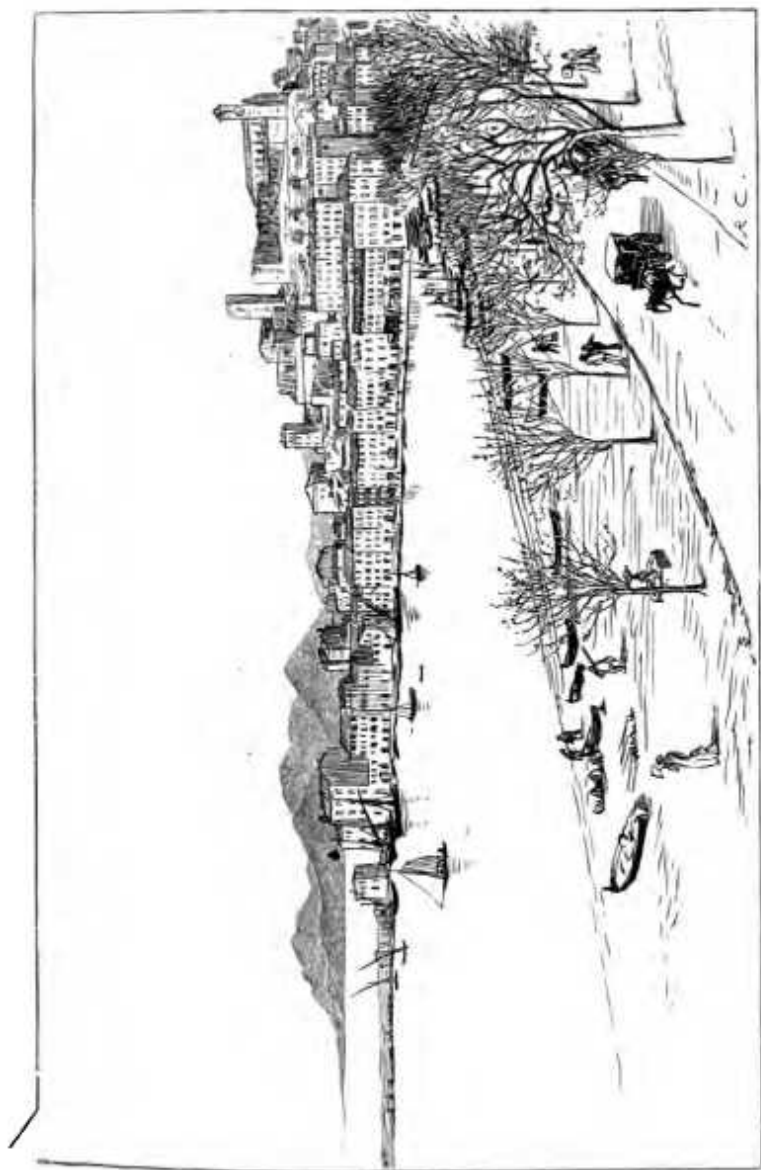

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## VISITOR'S GUIDE TO CANNES.

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### INTRODUCTION.

THE division of France for administrative and political purposes into Provinces and their subdivisions was abolished at the great Revolution, and, instead, the present system of Departments and their subdivisions was instituted. In this system a Department, the largest division, consists of Arrondissements, generally three in number, each of which contains about eight Cantons, and each Canton includes in the average ten members of the smallest division, a Commune. Cannes, formerly a village in the famous province of Provence, is now chief town of the Canton of the name, which includes the Communes of Cannes, Le Cannet, Mougins, Mouans-Sartoux, La Roquette, and Mandelieu, and forms part of the Arrondissement of Grasse, the seat of a sub-prefect and one of the three Arrondissements which constitute the Department of the Maritime Alps, of which the chief town and seat of the Prefect, the highest
