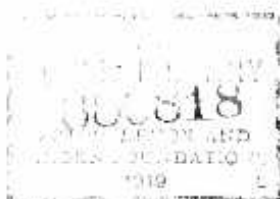

PREFACE.

In presenting the following history to the members and friends of the Regiment, and the public generally, the Author would state that the utmost accuracy has been observed in relation to marches, scouts, skirmishes, and camp life; the names of men and officers with remarks, and the list of diseases, have been taken from company-rolls, regimental and medical records, and the greatest care and fidelity paid thereto.

The history comprises the name, place of birth, year of enlistment, and date of re-enlistment of every man who has ever been connected with the regiment; the location and nature of wounds; when and where received; when, where, and why discharged; date, place, and cause of death; place of burial; promotion and resignation-table of officers, with full remarks; mile-table, giving distances traveled by water, railroad, and marches; consolidated table of all additional changes and transfers to and from the regiment; tabular list of diseases, with general summary thereto; sketches of the lives of Gen. Heckmann and Col. Zabriskie; every day's occurrences; interesting reminiscences; humorous anecdotes; regimental and general orders of interest and importance, together with much information of interest to the general reader.

The writer takes this opportunity to express his sincere gratitude to all officers and men who have either contributed towards his work, or assisted him in any information wanted.
