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

THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE ARCHITECTURAL LEAGUE

THE ARCHITECTURAL LEAGUE OF NEW YORK was organized with 18 members, February 18, 1881, reorganized January 18, 1886, and incorporated with 166 members November 2, 1888. Its purpose is the promotion of architecture and the allied fine arts. It recognizes the essential alliance of the decorative arts by providing that its President and its two Vice-Presidents shall be an architect, a mural painter and a sculptor. The membership of the League is wholly professional, and consists of three classes, namely: active, associate, and honorary members. Membership in each of which classes may be resident or non-resident.

In 1892, on the completion of the building of the American Fine Arts Society, the League obtained permanent quarters in that building, where it maintains a club room for the use of the members, a room for meetings, and its library. Its annual exhibitions are regularly held in the galleries of the same building.
