Proem

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OF all the devices the ingenuity of bookmen has yet hit upon to secure the attention of the reader none has been more widely used or more successful than a terse, apt, suggestive quotation. SHAKSPERE has been most frequently drawn upon, and his playwright's wit is ready and potent yet, after all these centuries, to help various literary wares to a good market.

The above appeared several years ago in the magazine called Shakespeariana, followed by a citation of some dozen examples. Believing a more complete list would be of interest, the following classified arrangement is offered. A few of these, it will be noticed, are implied or suggested by a quotation, and the precise text is not employed; but the derivation is not to be mistaken, for such a happy collocation of words as "Fortune's Boats" could only be inspired by the speech of Pisanio in Cymbeline.

Apparently the first use of Shakspere as title maker is Leigh Hunt's "Table Talk;" then follows Hawthorne's "Twice Told Tales," and Charles Kingsley with "Westward Ho!" The greater portion of these are however books published within the last twenty years. Mr. Howells easily leads with thirteen titles; Mrs. Brodhead is author of five books, four of which owe the felicitous combination of words which form

their titles to SHAKSPERE.

It is interesting to note how much the play of Hamlet exceeds all the rest as a source of inspiration, about one-third of the entire list being taken from that tragedy. As You Like It is next in favor, followed closely by Macbeth and Othello. In the case of the former, one title is used by three authors, which brings that play two numbers higher in the list than otherwise would be warranted. Dramatists do not often find suggestions for titles in the works of the great master—but seven names seeming to have their origin in his language.

The act or scene in which these quotations occur is not given, as those unfamiliar with the text will enjoy the search and, failing to at once find the lines, are sure to hit upon some others well worth the reading. Nor does this list claim completeness—indeed it may be, while this is printing, a half score of others are in process of incubation! Think of the good books that could be written with (at present unused) titles such as "The Whirligig of Time," "Blind Cupid," "Our Little Life," "A Poor Player," "A Friar of Orders Grey," "Vaulting Ambition," and "One Man in His Time."
