In these he glorified God; for these he will be admired and loved the world over; and for these he is commended to the young people of America.

#### CHAPTER I.

BIRTH AND ANCESTRY.

ROBERT EDWARD LEE, our Christian soldier and brave leader to many victories, "was born at Stratford, in Westmoreland County, Virginia, on the 19th of January, 1807."
