LETTER I.

MEEKNESS AND HUMILITY.

MY DEAR MARY,—Your letter, giving an account of your discouragements, was duly received. You will rest assured of our affectionate sympathy.

We know full well that the every day burdens of life are often harder to be borne than some great trial, which we can realize as coming directly from the hand of God. Though I know and feel all this, and though I sincerely wish to alleviate your sufferings, you will not think it strange that I shrink from the responsibility of giving advice in your time of difficulty.

However, I have arrived at the conclusion that some little good may arise, at least to my own mind, from reflecting upon the peculiar duties, that grow out of the connection of a minister's wife with the people of her hus-
