

M. Reclus calculates that Russia is ten times the size of France, and its possessions in Asia constitute one-third of that continent; the population is, however, comparatively speaking thinly scattered ; in European Russia it probably amounts to 81,000,000, and in Asiatic to 14,000,000, which give a total of 95,000,000. We can thus form some idea of the briliant prospects of the Russian language, which, instead of being limited to the narrow area of Welsh and Hungarian, is constantly expanding itself. It is fast absorbing the Finnish dialects of the Baltic provinces, and the various languages of Siberia; Lithuanian is yielding before it, and Polish has now almost entirely disappeared from that duchy. But it probably will not so easily absorb the latter, a highly cultivated tongue, which, including Posen, belonging to Prussia, and Galicia to Austria, is still spoken by 9,492,162 persons.1
