NOTE.

In the Diocesan Synod of Aberdeen, Sept. 8, 1863, the following motion was proposed and adopted, with only two dissentient voices:

"THAT THE SYNOD OF ABERDEEN, HAVING TAKEN INTO CONSIDERATION THE GREAT DUTY OF PROMOTING UNITY AMONG INDEPENDENT CHURCHES, NOW UNHAPPILY ESTRANGED, OR, FOR VARIOUS REASONS, CUT OFF FROM ORE ANOTHER, EXSOLVES TO PETITION THE EPISCOPAL SYNOD OF THIS CHURCH TO TAKE INTO ITS SERIOUS CONSIDERATION, WHETHER ANY AND WHAT MEANS COULD BE DEVISED FOR ENTERING ON REGOCIATIONS WITH THE SCANDINAVIAN CHURCHES, WITH THE VIEW OF ASCERTAINING THE PRACTICABILITY OF INTERCOMMUNION WITH THE SAME, ON PURELY CATROLIC GROUNDS AND IN ACCORDANCE WITH ESTABLISHED CATHOLIC PRINCIPLES."

The idea of preparing the following Letters had its origin in this motion. The Letters are, in a great measure, compilations from various sources, and therefore their chief value is—that they contain, within a narrow compass, a con-

siderable mass of information which lay scattered over many volumes, or was not readily accessible to the ordinary reader.

In procuring books and documents for the preparation of the Letters, the author has to acknowledge his obligations to the Very Rev. Principal Campbell, of the University of Aberdeen; Thomas Stephen, Esq., the author of the "History of the Church of Scotland;" the Rev. F. S. May, 15, Crown Terrace, London; the Rev. John Pype, M.A., Librarian, King's College, Aberdeen; and especially, His Excellency G. J. R. Gordon, H. M. Minister Plenipotentiary at Stuttgardt, who is intimately and personally acquainted with the present state of the Scandinavian Churches, and who kindly procured for him documents and translations which he could not otherwise have obtained.

LETTER I.

BBIRF ACCOUNT OF THE INTRODUCTION OF CHRIS-TIANITY INTO SCANDINAVIA.

SIR,

The history of the Scandinavian Church, while in its infant state, is neither very full nor very explicit. As of Scotland, so of Scandinavia, we can form only a vague conjecture as to the century when the first dawn of Christianity was shed abroad on the country; while, by whom the Gospel was first preached, or the exact year when the messengers of the Cross first reached the kingdoms of the North, we can with no certainty determine. We know that Nicolas Breakspeare, who, from being a swineherd in the neighbourhood of S. Alban's rose to the Pontificate, under the title of Adrian IV., was greatly instrumental in the conversion of the North. But it would be nowise more correct to assert that he
