INTRODUCTORY NOTE.

In that is prefixed to "Drift" I have recorded the principal events of his life, and have described his character as it was known to me. In that volume, also, I have presented many poems which illustrate the nobleness, the gentle simplicity, the tender human sentiment, the winning quaintness, and the half-cheerful, half-sad repose, that were blended in his character, and that made him so delightful and so dear to his numerous friends. While interpreting his nature, those poems likewise prove his genius, That genius, however, was manifested in various aspects, by other works; and these—in pursuance of the solemn duty that has been
