THE ARGUMENT.

It must be observed that the cardinal virtue of Temperance has hitherto chiefly appeared in a prose dress; sometimes quite plain, and sometimes very natty and picturesque, but seldom in the soft velvet, or glossy satin, or gorgeous brocade and delicate lace of real poetry, and never in the rich poetical costume of apt Alliteration's \sim artful adaptation.
