### PREFACE.

ALTHOUGH bells and bell-ringing have been associated with our Church from a very remote period, we have no certain information of the origin of ringing in peal, or advance from "rounds" to "called changes," &c., until the commencement of the seventeenth century, at which date there existed societies that had for their object the "exercise of the art of ringing;" but these appear to have become extinct without leaving any record of the nature of their performances. In 1637, however, a society was formed in London, under the appellation of "College Youths," for the study and practice of change ringing, which led to the introduction of a system of ringing by rule, or method, in or about the year 1642, and the publication of a treatise on the art by Mr. Fabian Stedman (a member of the society) in 1668. This Society still remains in existence; whose time-honoured rolls record the achievement of many highly creditable performances; also a list of its members, as enrolled; which comprises persons of almost every conceivable rank ; showing also the rise and decline of change ringing through the interval. For many years it held a high position among the scientific amusements of the period, then declined almost exclusively into the hands of the labouring popu-
