#### RULES.

- 1.—That the Society shall be called the RECORD SOCIETY, and shall have for its object the transcribing and publishing of Original Documents relating to the Counties of Lancaster and Chester.
- 2.—That the affairs of the Society shall be governed by a Council consisting of a President and twelve Members, the former of whom shall be annually elected by the Council.
  - 8.—That three Members of the Council shall form a quorum.
- 4.—That the subscription of Members of the Society shall be £1 1s. per annum, which shall entitle them to the publications for the year; but any Member whose subscription shall be two years in arrear shall thereupon be removed from the Society, and shall not be re-admitted until all arrears have been paid. The number of Members is limited to 350.
- 5.—That the subscriptions shall be due in advance on the 80th of June in each year, and that no work shall be issued to any Member whose subscription is in arrear.
- 6.—That an Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of October, of which due notice shall be sent to all the Members. At this meeting a Report of the work of the Society, with a Statement of the Income and Expenditure, shall be presented. These shall be annually published, together with a List of Members and the Rules of the Society.
- 7.—That so long as the funds of the Society permit, two volumes at least shall be issued to the Members in each year,
- 8.—That no copies of the publications of the Society shall be sold to non-members, except at an increased price to be fixed by the Council.
- 9.—That no payment shall be made to any person for editing any work for the Society, but that the Editor of each Volume shall be entitled to twenty copies of the work so edited by him.
- 10.—That the Treasurer's Accounts shall be audited by two Members of the Society, who shall be elected at the Annual Meeting.
- 11.—No alteration shall be made in any of the above Rules except at the Annual General Meeting. Notice of any proposed alterations must be sent to the Hon. Secretary a month before such General Meeting.
- 12.—That a meeting of the Council of the Society shall be called by the Hon. Secretary at least once in every three months.

The Annual Subscription of £1 1s., entitling the Members to all the Volumes issued for that year, may be paid to the Hon. Treasurer, or to the credit of the Society at their Bankers, the Manchester and Liverpool District Banking Company, Limited, at any of their branches.

## Report for the Year 1903-1904.

Read at the Council Meeting held in the Audit Room of the Chetham Hospital, Manchester, October 24th, 1904.

Sixce the last Annual Meeting, held on the 19th October, 1903, two volumes have been issued to the Members. These are, Volume 47, being Part I. of the Lancashire Assize Rolls, 1202-1281, edited by Colonel Parker, and Volume 48 being Lancashire Inquests, Extents and Feudal Aids, 1205-1307, which has been edited by Mr. William Farrer.

The Council feel that it would be difficult to exaggerate the importance of these two books as contributions to the early history of Lancashire, and they view with much satisfaction the continuation of the printing, in the near future, of both series of documents.

For the current year the Members will receive Part II. of the Assize Rolls, 1291-1285, to which will be added an Appendix, including extracts from the Patent Rolls relating to special Lancashire Assizes, and from the Pipe Rolls, together with a full index of persons and places. The second volume for the year will be Part III. of the Lancashire Final Concords, 1377-1509, which will be edited, as were the two former parts, by Mr. William Farrer. The Society has to thank Colonel Parker and Mr. Farrer for generously presenting the transcripts of both these volumes.

As to future work, the amount of material at the Society's command is so great that the difficulty is only one of selection. The Council has at this moment material ready, and competent workers willing to edit upwards of ten volumes of the greatest interest and importance in the elucidation of the history of the two Counties, but owing to the poor support with which the Society meets, it is only possible to put two of them in hand at present. It is very deplorable that out of the five million inhabitants of Lancashire and Cheshire, scarcely two hundred can be found to contribute the sum of one guinea per annum to this important educational work.

The Rolls of Admission to the Freedom of the City of Chester (1992-1805) have been carefully transcribed, and where possible, collated with the original entries in the Mayor's Books, by Mr. J. H. E. Bennett, of Chester. Mr. Bennett has presented this transcript to the Society, and has undertaken to edit the volume; it is proposed to put this in the printers' hands at once. These Rolls relate to many persons in Lancashire as well as Cheshire. A complete transcript of the Marriage Licences of the ancient diocese of Chester, including Lancashire south of the Ribble, is in preparation, and at the present time the material for at least two volumes, covering the period 1606-1625, could be handed to the printers. The transcripts of a voluminous collection of Cheshirs pedigrees, now preserved among the Harleian MSS., which includes the Heralds' Visitation of Cheshire for 1618, is in the hands of the Editor, as also is a transcript of the Chartulary of St. Werburgh's Abbey in Chester. In addition to these, an Index of the recently found Wills at the Probate Registry in Chester, 1595-1665, an Index to the Wills and Inventories remaining in the Bishop's Registry in Chester (1701-1800), and the Hearth Tax Returns for the County of Chester for the year 1668, only await the necessary funds to enable the Council to place them in the hands of the Members.
