13th child of Francis Loud, Jr., and Onner Prince Loud.

FRANCIS LOUD 1st and his brother came from Scotland. The brother settled in St. Johns, N. B., Francis settled in Sagadahoc on the Kennebec River, Me. In 1676, during the war, he was driven from his home by the Indians. He, with several of his neighbors, petitioned Sir Edmund Andros, for the right to settle on Arrowsic Island, where we find him in 1679. He subsequently settled in Ipswich, Mass., with his family. He afterwards returned to Maine, where in 1726 we find him posted at Fort Marys, Biddeford, where he probably died.

FRANCIS LOUD, JR., son of the above, was born in Ipswich, Mass., July 26, 1700. Onner Prince, daughter of Isaac Prince, who married Mary Turner, a descendant of the fourth generation from Elder William Brewster of the Mayflower, born in Hull, Mass., October 26, 1701. They were published as residents of Weymouth, Mass., October 22, 1722. No record of their marriage. Francis died in Weymouth January 22, 1774; Onner P. Loud, January, 18, 1777.

Caleb and Susanna, his wife, were both born in Weymouth, where they were married. Although a seafaring man, and a noted swimmer, yet he was drowned while bathing near his own house, at the age of 35 years.

After his death, the widow and daughter, moved first to Cum-
 mington, thence to Hunter, Greene county, N. Y., and died there or in
 Catskill. I have a copy of a letter written by her, dated Hunter,
 Greene county, N. Y., February 20, 1819.

Caleb Loud, Jr., was born in Weymouth. He was but ten years
 old when his father was drowned, and was taken by his Uncle Lebbeus
 Bates, (who had been appointed guardian of all the children), to
 Cummington. He lived with Ebenezer Snell, working on the farm
 and attending school, until he went to learn the trade of carpenter
 and joiner with Ezekiel Baldwin in Easthampton. After serving his
 time here he returned to Boston and Weymouth, for some little time,
 working at his trade. Going back to Easthampton he was married
 in 1796 to Jerusha Clark, a daughter of Lieut. Asahel Clark, an
 officer in the Revolution. He was a very skillful mechanic, and the
 first to introduce the system, called the square rule, in framing build-
 ings; in place of the old scribe rule, or cut and try. He
 was engaged for a number of years in building churches, court
 houses and other large buildings, in different parts of the State.
 He was an honest and reliable man in all his dealings, a kind neigh-
 bor and worthy citizen in every respect. Of a jovial disposition and

fond of a joke, he was company everywhere. Having a fondness for music, during his stay in Boston he bought him a Bass Viol, and being a member of the choir in Easthampton, he introduced the "fiddle, as they called it," into the church choir, amid so great opposition of a few, that it came near swamping the concern. In fact one Oliver Clark, a Baptist Elder and others, did leave the church. The above Ezekiel Baldwin, an eccentric genius, had a habit, about his work, of using very often, the word "Fiddle Faddle," which so annoyed the said Oliver that he asked him one day what Fiddle Faddle meant. Ezekiel's reply was: "Fiddle is the instrument they use in church, and Faddle is a hard shell Baptist," which satisfied the Elder.

The old Bass Viol built in 1798 is still a member of the family, and highly respected.

Austin Loud was born in Westhampton, Mass., was a builder and millright, ever busy and very ingenious, readily turning his hand to any mechanical work from a fiddle to a meeting house. In 1832 with his family he moved to Kirtland, O., where he built a grist and saw mill in which the lumber for the Mormon Temple was sawed.
