

ROM very remote times the islands of Great-Britain had been divided into two diffinct Parts or Regions.

In the Southern part feven different Sovereignties were established, which became fucceffively united into one, and formed the Monarchy and Country of England.

The Northern part of the Island, being nearly three hundred miles in length, formed the Kingdom and Country of Scotland ; which was totally independent on, and unconnected with the Monarchy established in the South.

Those Kings who had united the feven Saxon Sovereignties under their dominion, were not without fome ambition alfo to make the conqueft of Scotland, as we may judge from the infcriptions
