PREFACE.

THE following list has been compiled between April 14, 1886, and the present date, from the printed catalogues of Bodleian MSS. and of MSS. in the College Libraries of Oxford, for the use of students of the history of the University and City.

College MSS., except Ch. Ch., 1852. Ch. Ch. MSS., 1867. Some Bodley Additional MSS are included, so far as they are entered in the Bodleian interleaved copy of the Index of 1697. The Oriental catalogues have also been consulted. The compiler has not felt himself bound to verify the entries in the printed indexes referred to.

The arrangement by subjects, which is original, is an experiment, on a larger scale than has yet been attempted for any place, to bring into convenient order the literature of Oxford. Personal names have been almost entirely omitted. Where the subdivision of a subject is more elaborate under the heading of the University than under the City, it must be remembered that the smaller divisions are supposed to be implicit in the larger, when not expressly drawn out. Thus Boating (see 863) is, for the City, 353.

It is hoped that the order of subjects and the notation used may be of some independent value to those who are likely to use this list. If they will arrange their own Oxford notes on uniform slips of paper (say $5 \times 2\frac{1}{4}$ in.) in accordance with the present scheme, much additional information might be made available for reference. The notation is specially adapted to allow of an expansion based on the principle that each unit indicates a subdivision of the preceding unit. Thus 631-639 are capable of infinite subdivision by such forms as 6311-6319, 6321-6329, etc. The numbers in the present list do not exceed (or fall short of) three digits, so that between any two there may be inserted nine additional divisions without exceeding four digits.

The List formed part of the compiler's Library work, and is printed by the desire of Bodley's Librarian.
