This rough list is printed in the hope that it may be of use to a few friends who are interested in the subjects herein treated. Covering a wide range of happenings and nearly one-hundred and fifty years of time it gives many unlooked for hints and clews leading to a better understanding of our history. The fifty-six volumes covered by this list were gathered together with various objects in view, hence the apparent lack of set purpose in their selection. Such as they are, they are now at the service of those who receive this book from me. Sooner or later they will be given to a library where they can be more freely used by a wider circle of students.

In this collection the first nine volumes of State Papers, the Plymouth, Temple, Sedgwick, Phips, and Kidd Papers are calendared at length in the Calendar of State Papers, Colonial Series, America and West Indies, preserved in the Public Record Office, London. By reference to these calendars further details of the contents of the material here listed may readily be found. The documents in the tenth volume of State Papers are calendared in Brymner's Report on Canadian Archives for 1883. There is no adequate calendar for the eleventh and twelfth volumes of State Papers. The thirteenth volume is calendared in the Fourteenth Report, appendix, part X, of the Historical Manuscripts Commission, being the manuscripts of the Earl of Dartmouth, Vol. II, American Papers.
