ERRATA.

Page 58—Highlands of Neversink.—It ought to be stated that these two towers are fitted up with French lenses of the first and second order, and that they have been seen 39 miles—ordinarily 30 miles.

Page 61—The Pea Patch Light is inserted as if still in existence. It was discontinued after the fort was burnt, some years ago.

Page 77—Cape Florida Light has not been rebuilt since the Indians burnt it in 1836.

Page 80—The Mobile Point Light House is stated to be a *fixed* light; it is a *revolving* light; and instead of 12 to 14 miles as stated, it can be seen in clear weather 20 miles.

Page 94—Oswego Light, on the main land, was discontinued some years ago, and a Beacon built upon the pier used in place of it.

Page 100—Turtle Island Light, in Lake Erie, is stated to be situated at the entrance of Shaumer Bay. It is situated at the entrance of Maumee Bay—there being no such place as Shaumer Bay.

Page 103—Potowatomie Light stands 150 feet high—the island being 120, and the tower 30 feet.
