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

PREFACE.

This little work is meant to be partly introductory, partly supplementary, to the Progressive Exercises of Mr. Gepp. It will serve as an introduction to that deservedly popular treatise, inasmuch as it begins with the simplest elements of Latin verse composition. It may also serve as a supplement, from its containing a number of Exercises similar in form to those there given. So far as it is competent to answer this latter purpose, no apology need be made for its appearance.
