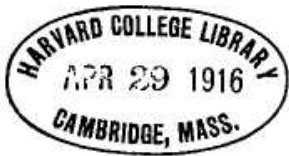

FOREWORD

This volume is privately printed, as an aid in the collection of material for my Hawaiian library. Strictly speaking, it is more a working sheet than a catalogue; for it has many cross-references, and must contain many errors, since I am unable here in Boston to compare the proof with the original items out in Honolulu.

A few explanations are perhaps needed. The references to the right, following a dash, indicate the location of the item in the library: Bound Volumes are in numbered stacks and lettered units; Pamphlets are on shelves in consecutively numbered cases. Publications issued by the various departments of the Hawaiian Government during the Monarchy and the Republic are to be found under "Government Reports;" while all such items issued since annexation (June, 1900) are to be found under "Territorial Reports." Where a *non de plume* is used, and the author's name is known, both are inserted with a cross-reference.

This library I shall bequeath to the Hawaiian Mission Children's Society, an organization founded in 1854, which has for one of its objects the noble desire to perpetuate the memory of the Fathers and Mothers who first brought the light of Christianity to these Islands. Hence, anything printed or written about or by the missionaries is particularly desired.

A collection like this is of value in proportion to its use, and while I am not willing that any item should be taken away or borrowed, yet any student with proper credentials is welcome to its examination or to its continued use.

1. Introduction
